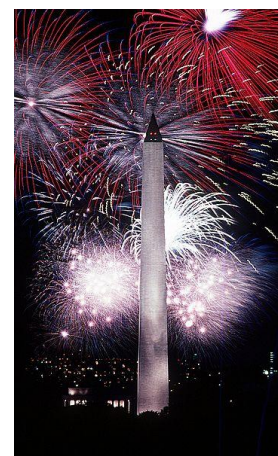

THE FOURTH OF JULY – NATIONAL HOLIDAY

The terms "Independence Day" and "Fourth of July" are used almost interchangeably today, synonymously denoting the National Day of the USA, a federal holiday in honor of the Declaration of Independence's adoption in 1776. By this act, the thirteen former colonies formally claimed and declared independence from Great Britain and its king. The celebrations on Independence Day are of a decisively patriotic quality, emphasizing and celebrating the history and traditions of the still comparably young nation. Political speeches and ceremonies are accompanied by "fireworks, parades, barbecues, carnivals, fairs, picnics, concerts, baseball games, family reunions" (Wikipedia) in every corner of the country.



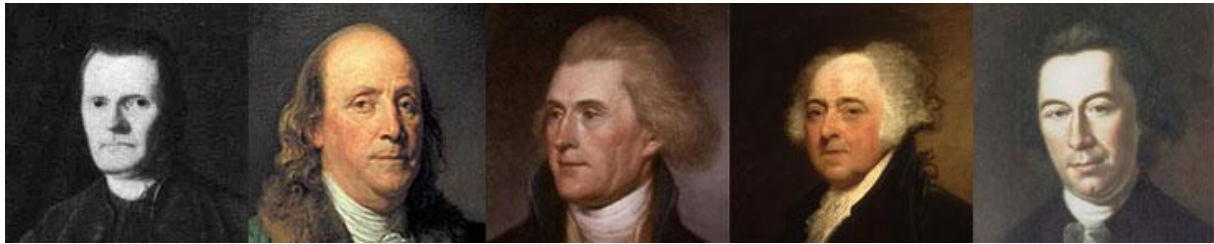
Display of fireworks over the Washington Monument

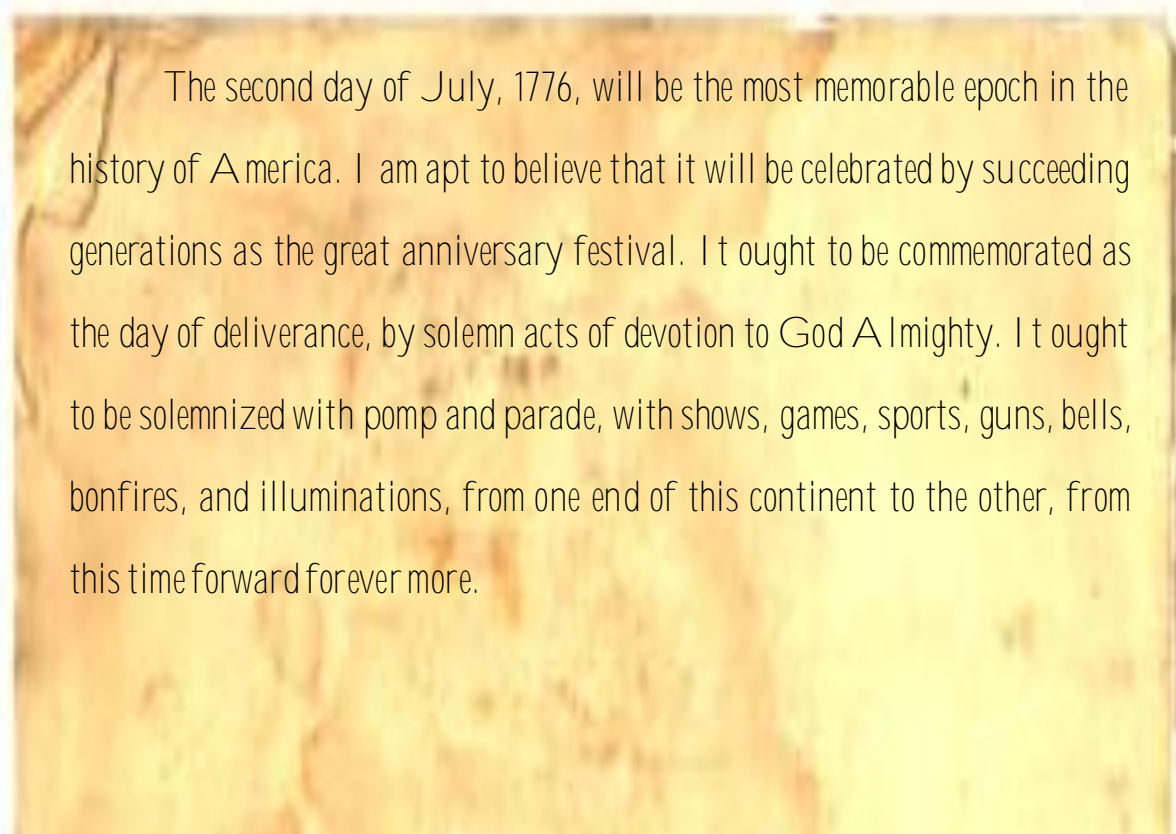
HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

To be precise, the official legal separation of the Thirteen Colonies from the United had already occurred on July 2nd 1776, when the Second Continental Congress approvingly voted on a Resolution of Independence. The Declaration of Independence, passed two days later, was actually an accompanying piece explaining this decision. Thomas Jefferson, John Adams, Benjamin Franklin, Roger Sherman and Robert Livingston, the so-called Committee of Five, were its authors.

Before the Declaration of Independence was issued in 1776, war between the Thirteen Colonies and Great Britain had been raging for well over a year. In the aftermath of the Seven Years' War in 1763, interests and relations between them had been growing

This land was made for you and me.*

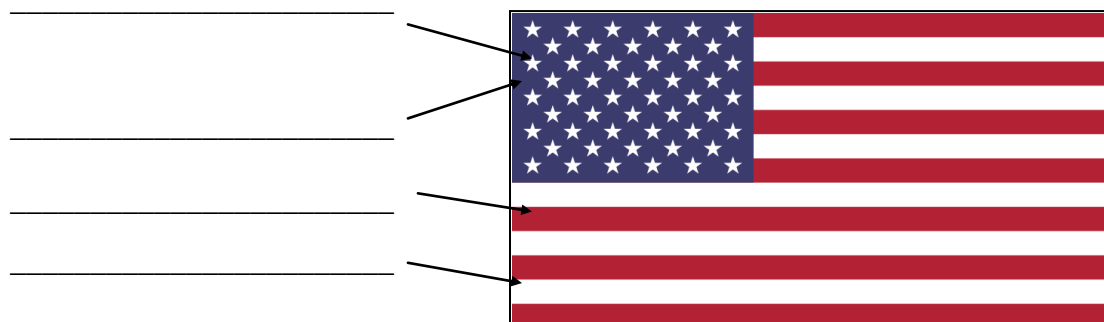
*One bright sunny morning in the shadow of the steeple

THE FLAG OF THE UNITED STATES

Task: Read the text and label the arrows above.

The flag of the United States of America is called the "Star-Spangled Banner" or just nicknamed "Stars and Stripes". It consists, in its current version, of 7 red and 6 white stripes, symbolizing the original thirteen colonies, and a small blue jack flag in the upper left corner, containing 50 white stars, one star for each of the federal states.

The colors stem from the original British Union Jack, but their use in the Star-Spangled Banner comes with several connotations, a symbolic value attributed to each of them:

White	-	purity, innocence
Red	-	valor, hardiness
Blue	-	vigilance, perseverance, justice

America's national anthem pays homage to the American Flag. After the bombing of Fort McHenry, Baltimore, during the War of 1812, the author Francis Scott Key was so relieved to see the still hoisted up after a night of relentless British attacks, that he decided to express his mirth over the American victory in the form of a song dedicated to the image of that waving American Flag. **Key's** song became the national anthem of the USA.
