Inside she found the head of a duck. Although she was terrified, she fetched it and finally tossed it into the fire.

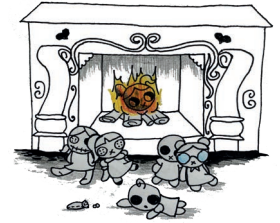

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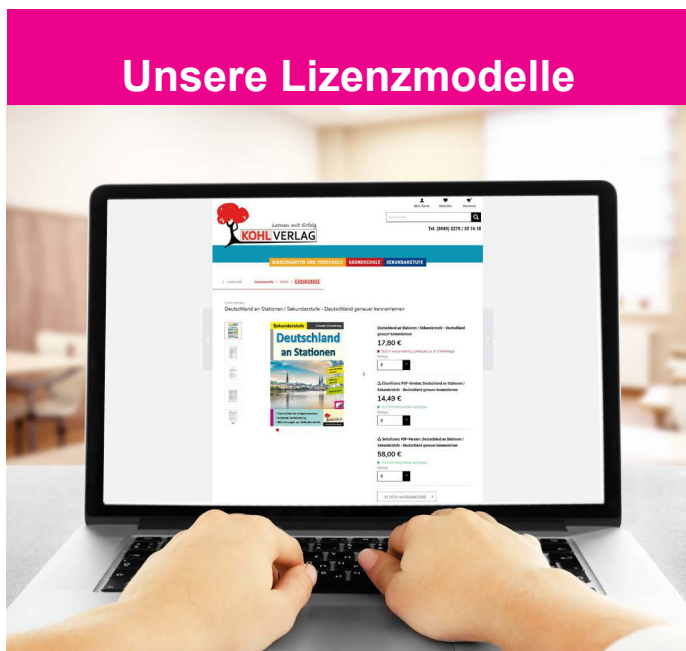
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
